Assignment: Interview Proposal and Questions Exercise Due: Friday, 4/24, 11:59 p.m.

- 1) **Interview Proposal:** Please write 1 paragraph (5-7 sentences) that answers the following questions (and anything else that you'd like to add):
 - What historical questions are driving your oral history? Why are they important? What contemporary concerns have led you to these questions?
 - What do you want to accomplish with, or learn through, this oral history?
 - Why is this work important to you and to the community? What is its projected impact?
 - Have you identified whom you will interview? How did you select this person?
 - What do you hope to learn from interviewing this person that you cannot learn from other sources?
 - How do you plan to prepare yourself for this interview?

2) Proposed Interview Questions

Please follow the format outline below. You should have a total of at least 17 questions.

- **Start-up questions** (2): Begin with two start-up questions, such as brief biographical inquiries, to get your interviewee and yourself comfortable before you change to your topic list.
- Main topics questions (5): Organize your interview questions into at least 5 main topics. Possible topics: family background; memories of home and significant others; migration experiences; gentrification of a neighborhood; perspective on relevant historical events; employment history; community life; experiences with racism, etc. Important: For this class, one of your main topic questions will be on COVID-19.
- **Subtopics questions (3 per main topics questions)**: For each main topic, come up with 3 subtopics questions that ask for greater detail, more contextual data, person's values and feelings.

Tips:

- Cover the material chronologically wherever possible, as this is the way most people best remember events.
- Start questions with: Tell me about/can you describe ...

What do you remember/think/feel about . . .

What was it like...

Explain/Expand/Describe . . .

How have xxx events affected you ...

- Ask questions that encourage your interviewee to share not only what they did, but also what they thought and felt about what they did.
- Ask questions that encourage your interviewee to talk about their *own* experiences—to provide personal stories and memories that you will not find in standard histories.
